
The Southern Regional Health Authority Story

The Southern Regional Health Authority (SRHA) is a statutory body of the Ministry of Health & Wellness, which delivers healthcare to more than 600,000 residents in the parishes of Manchester, Clarendon and St. Elizabeth. It is the second largest of the four Regional Health Authorities in Jamaica.

The Regional Health Authorities were formed in 1997 under the National Health Services Act, which was aimed at improving the management of healthcare facilities and bringing accountability to the local level. The Regional Health Authority is managed by a Board of Management, along with the Regional Director, who is responsible for the daily management of the region.

The SRHA has a staff complement of more than 3000 employees and administrates 74 health centres, five hospitals and one community hospital. The hospitals include the Mandeville Regional Hospital-Type B, the Percy Junor Hospital-Type C, the May Pen Hospital-Type B, the Lionel Town Hospital-Type C, the Black River Hospital-Type C and the Chapelton Community Hospital.





Conversion of Buses into Ambulances Results in Millions in Savings

The Southern Regional Health Authority (SRHA) has been lauded for its innovative initiative of converting and customizing new mini-buses into ambulances, resulting in millions in savings.

SRHA Fleet Coordinator, Robert Robinson conceptualized the initiative in 2016 and explained that a new ambulance would cost \$14 million with a delivery time of six months; however, the retrofitted ambulances have a shortened delivery time of eight weeks.

Each retrofitted ambulance is equipped with: a heart monitor, a dash cam, stainless hand wash sink with soap dispenser, suction machines, ECG machine, stainless steel dustbin, fog lamps, emergency lights, double nurses seats, fire extinguisher, oxygen, bench, stretcher, storage area, non-stick flooring, inverter; in addition to storage cupboards. The specifications were added following consultation with the primary users of the ambulances and are expected to give at least 10 years of good service.

Since 2016, nine ambulances have been retrofitted, resulting in more than \$25 million in savings. This brings the total amount in the fleet to 17 ambulances.

Unique Health Fair for Pregnant Women Making Strides

An antenatal health fair, dubbed Pregnant Mothers Advancing Through Education (PREGMATE), by the Manchester Midwives Association, and the only one of its kind in Jamaica, has been making great strides in empowering pregnant women to take charge of their reproductive health.

The initiative was developed out of the need to educate pregnant women, as there was an increase in areas of concern in pregnancy including anemia, hypertension, dental care and nutrition. The pregnant women are exposed to several topics including: the importance of dental hygiene in pregnancy, postpartum depression, naming and registration of babies, foetal growth and development, pre-eclampsia and eclampsia, complimentary feeding and the importance of exercise in pregnancy.



Two hundred and thirty three units of blood were collected at the 'One Love, One Blood' donation drive, staged by the Mandeville Regional Hospital (MRH) in Manchester, the largest single day blood donation drive in Jamaica, held on February 7, 2018.

The donation drive was more than an effort to solicit blood and was largely about behaviour change, encouraging consistent voluntary blood donation to improve supplies and reducing the demand for blood caused by preventable motor vehicle accidents and motor cyclists.

It was also used to launch the 'RideWise' Safe Biking campaign for motor cyclists, which encourages safe use of the road and wearing of appropriate protective gear in addition to educating donors and the youth as the next generation needed to bring about a long-term change in their perspective.

Patients Welcome Laparoscopic Surgeries

Patients in the southern region have welcomed laparoscopic surgeries which are now being offered by the Southern Regional Health Authority, as part of its strategic plan to continuously improve the delivery of quality and advanced healthcare to patients.

Laparoscopic surgery or minimally invasive surgery is a modern surgical technique in which operations in the abdomen are performed through small incisions, rather than the larger incisions needed in open surgery. With the advances in surgical principles and techniques, laparoscopic surgery is considered the standard of care and is being offered at the Mandeville Regional and Percy Junor hospitals in Manchester, the May Pen Hospital in Clarendon and the Black River Hospital in St. Elizabeth; following the acquisition of four state-of-the-art high definition laparoscopic towers.

212 Students, 52 Teachers Trained as Ambassadors for Healthier Lifestyle in Schools

Two hundred and twelve students and 52 teachers from the parishes of Clarendon, St. Elizabeth and Manchester are now trained ambassadors who will strengthen the capacity of their schools to become a healthier setting for working and learning.

One hundred and seventeen students and 25 teachers from 29 high schools were trained, while 95 students and 25 teachers were trained from 14 primary schools in April 2019. The ambassadors were trained as part of the Jamaica Moves in Schools programme, which is a partnership between the Ministries of Health and Education, through the Jamaica Moves initiative. As ambassadors the students and teachers will now strengthen the health capacity of their schools through a programme designed by the Ministries of Health and Education.

Stroke Registry & Support Services Now Available for Central Jamaica

The Percy Junor Hospital (PJH) in north east Manchester has launched its revolutionary stroke registry and support services, aimed at capturing vital information to inform policy and treatment decisions and also to provide support for families in caring for relatives diagnosed with stroke.

The stroke registry will be placed in the accident and emergency department and once a patient is assessed and given the tentative diagnosis and if they are experiencing a stroke for the first time, their information will be collated and entered into the registry. This will be an ongoing research and over time, the data will be analyzed to ascertain the types of trends and patterns associated with the condition. Meetings will be held to provide caregivers and family members with counselling and other services in caring for their family members diagnosed with stroke.

Public Health Inspectors Partner with Chinese Nationals to Enhance Food Safety

The Public Health Inspectors (PHI) in Clarendon have initiated a programme that trains Chinese nationals and their Jamaican workers in food safety, in order to improve the standards in their establishments.

Normally persons who work in food establishments would take a test for the food handler's permit, but for the Chinese nationals, the language barrier has been playing a part in maintaining satisfactory levels of food safety compliance.

With this programme, the Chinese nationals and their Jamaican workers were trained in areas of personal hygiene, food protection, proper hand washing, solid waste management, food storage, pest control, general sanitation, bathroom cleanliness, food handler's dress, workplace ethics, interpersonal relationships and handling language barriers.

\$8 Million in Restraints for Mentally Challenged Clients

The Southern Regional Health Authority (SRHA) has procured 50 sets of pinel restraints valued at \$8 million, to restrain mentally ill patients in a more compassionate manner for their safety and those around them.

The restraints were acquired and allocated in March 2021 to the SRHA's five major hospitals and major health centres. The crisis response buses in each parish have also been outfitted with restraints. Before the acquisition of the restraints, less ideal methods were used to restrain mentally challenged patients; however, these restraints will provide involuntary confinement and restrict the movement of patients in a more compassionate manner for their safety and those around them for a limited amount of time.

This is part of the Government's thrust to provide a framework that enables mothers to acquire the skills they need to breastfeed exclusively for the first six months of their babies' lives. The official ceremony was held on July 29, 2022.

Previously in 2018, the hospital opened a breastfeeding training room to assist all mothers who deliver at the hospital with support and training in the proper breastfeeding techniques. This will be facilitated by staff members who completed hours of training to enhance the support and training to mothers.



Software Applications Created Internally to Boost Operations

The Information, Communication and Technology (ICT) branch of the Southern Regional Health Authority created several application softwares to manage and assist with the smooth running of the authority's roles and responsibilities.

The applications include: the Fleet Management System, designed to track and monitor all activities relating to each vehicle in the fleet; the Inventory Management System which manages all the inventory sundry items in a facility, so as to manage reporting and ensuring that inventory items are always available. Additionally, the Human Resources Indexing System was developed for the Human Resources (HR) department to manage staff files, allowing the officers to easily file and retrieve a record from the system. Also, the HR Travel Register was designed to assist the accounts, payroll and HR departments in managing all the information relating to the vehicles of travelling officers.

The MISSY system was developed to manage all the activities of the ICT department and includes requisition management, inventory management, ID system management and other features. Also, the Appointment Systems Login System was designed to provide a platform for clinicians, records management staff and patients to interface in making appointments electronically which provides better control of the clinics.



Staff Embrace Healthcare Workers Appreciation Month Celebration

July 2022 was recognised as Healthcare Workers Appreciation Month, under the theme, "Honouring Commitment, Service & Sacrifice"; and healthcare workers across the island were recognised and celebrated during the month. Mandeville Hospital Benefits From Manchester Wellness Foundation

The Mandeville Regional Hospital has been the beneficiary of several pieces of equipment donated by the Manchester Wellness Foundation.

In 2017, the foundation donated equipment valued at \$823,000.00 to the hospital's Ear, Nose and Throat (ENT) department which enables clinicians to remove foreign objects from the oesophagus. In 2019, the group handed over a surgical microscope to the ENT department valued at \$3.1 million which will help to treat the condition, serous otitis media with effusion; which is commonly known as glue ears and affects learning. This impacts a large number of children in the southern region.

Additionally, the foundation donated a resectoscope, used in prostate and bladder surgeries, valued at \$1.1 million in 2022. The equipment and its accessories are used for most of the endoscopic surgeries performed in the urology department and is absent in many hospitals.


Black River Hospital Foundation Launched Land Donated to Hospital to Boost Development

The Black River Hospital Foundation was officially launched on Thursday, December 7, 2017 to advance and support public healthcare in St. Elizabeth.

During the launch ceremony on the lawns of the hospital, an estimated \$3 million was pledged to construct a private wing at the Type C facility. The private wing was targeted as one of the first tasks of the foundation, which can be used to fill the gaps or offset costs associated with the provision of universal access to healthcare.

Also, in 2017, the hospital received 5.0627 hectares of land valued at \$8.6 million from retired nurse now living overseas, Ms. Tatleen Vassell. The land, which is located in Cheltenham, near New Market in St. Elizabeth, is one of the single largest donations to the hospital and will be factored into the hospital's developmental plan. Ms. Vassell noted that her family also has a long history of contributing to the hospital.

May Pen Hospital to Save Millions Annually From New AC System

The Petroleum Corporation of Jamaica carried out an air-conditioning overhaul at the May Pen Hospital in Clarendon at a cost of approximately \$73.6 million. The project, under the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Programme will reduce the facility's electricity consumption for cooling by 20 per cent, with annual savings of approximately \$5.2 million.

The project was officially handed over on May 9, 2019 and involved the installation of a modern, energy-efficient cooling system at the accident and emergency department, which will ensure that this section of the hospital meets the compliance standards for fresh air. Another cooling system was installed at the offices of the Clarendon Health Department.

The multifaceted intervention will provide greater comfort for patients and staff and compliments the Health & Wellness Ministry's Compassionate Care Programme.

Ginger Hill Health Centre Adopted

The Ginger Hill Health Centre in St. Elizabeth, which serves some 2000 persons annually, has been adopted by the National Supply Foundation, under the Ministry of Health and Wellness Adopt-A-Clinic programme. A Memorandum of Understanding was signed on Friday, August 14, 2020 by the National Supply Foundation to support the facility to the tune of \$3 million for three years.

The Chen See family, owners of the National Supply Company Limited has connections with the Ginger Hill community as the patriarch of the family had settled and raised his family in the community. The clinic, which was built in 1960 offers several services including: child health, family planning, antenatal, postnatal, nutrition and monitoring support, immunization, mental health, dressing and pap smear.

Gifts for Mandeville Regional Hospital

The Mandeville Regional Hospital (MRH) in Manchester was the beneficiary of a state-of-the-art anaesthetic machine valued at \$4 million, which was handed over on November 14, 2017. The machine was donated to the MRH by the CHASE Fund and the Rotary Club of Mandeville in association with the Church Teachers' College.

This life-saving machine, which is critical to safe surgical procedures will boost the quality of service to patients and enable the hospital to improve their response to patients.

In 2019, the hospital also received two operating theatre stretchers, one desktop autoclave, six infusion pumps, one cardiac monitor and two vital signs monitors, valued at \$4,052,000 from the Guardian Group Foundation which used proceeds from its "Keep it Alive" 5K Night Runs. The donation was made on January 21, 2019.

May Pen Hospital Receives Essential Equipment

The May Pen Hospital in Clarendon received medical equipment and supplies from bauxite/alumina company, Jamalco, valued at US80,000.00 on May 8, 2018.

The supplies and medical equipment included: emergency patient stretcher trolleys, hand drills, four orthopaedic beds and mattresses, 31 pieces of orthopaedic equipment and accompanying accessories, and two pelvic-reduction clamps.

On September 5, 2019, the hospital also received a digital mobile C-arm machine, valued at J\$10 million, through grant funding from the Japanese government under the Grass-roots Human Security Project.

A C-arm machine is an imaging scanner intensifier which has radiographic capabilities, though it is used primarily for fluoroscopic intraoperative imaging during surgical, orthopaedic and emergency-care procedures. It is an essential part of the contemporary practice of orthopaedic surgery, with its use being standard of care in performing a majority of surgeries.

BRH Benefits From Medical Equipment & Cash Donation

The Black River Hospital (BRH) in St. Elizabeth received a donation of medical equipment, valued at \$2.9 million, from the Faculty of Medical Sciences, University of the West Indies, Mona (UWI, Mona), Medical Class of 2019. The donation which includes a defibrillator, two transport stretchers, a plaster saw, a diagnostic set, 3 forceps and a digital paediatric scale, was handed over to the facility on September 26, 2020.

The Percy Junor Hospital (PJH) in Manchester was gifted with a new operating theatre bed valued at US\$10,250, which will boost the facility's capacity to perform the 600 operations it does annually.

The bed, which was received in November 2021, was donated by the Rachael Dixon Memorial Fund and has become the hospital's primary and major operating theatre bed which will be used daily for emergency and elective surgeries.

The hospital also received a high-flow nasal cannula machine valued at US\$10,000, to support COVID-19 patients who need oxygen, particularly during a surge in cases. Digital X-Ray System Boosting Quality & Efficient Diagnostic Services

The Southern Regional Health Authority (SRHA) acquired a digital x-ray system valued at \$65.3 million, with funding support from the CHASE Fund, which will be utilized at the Authority's main hospitals (Black River, Mandeville Regional, Percy Junor, and the May Pen hospitals, in addition to the primary Type 3 health centres.

There are several benefits to be derived including faster image acquisition and better workflow, superior image quality, post processing, patients being exposed to less radiation, better monitoring of patient radiation dose, reduced operation cost, faster image distribution, in addition to not needing a filing room for film storage.

The SRHA is dedicated to providing the highest level of patient care by utilizing advanced diagnostic equipment at its facilities.

CCTV Cameras for SRHA Hospitals



St. Elizabeth Health Centres Renovated and Expanded

The Balaclava Health Centre in St. Elizabeth was officially reopened on Thursday, December 7, 2017, with expanded space and amenities to better serve the more than 15,000 persons who reside in the community and outlying districts.

The rehabilitation of the facility was undertaken with a capital injection of \$14 million from the Culture, Health, Arts, Science and Education (CHASE) Fund, and included replacing the timber roof with concrete, reinforcing the foundation to make it structurally sound, the addition of 400 square feet of office space, installation of concrete cupboards, and laying of new tiles, among other things.

Additionally, the Portsea Health Centre in St. Elizabeth was expanded at a cost of \$5 million, funded by the National Health Fund, with support from the community. The expanded health centre was opened on May 3, 2018.

The additional space which was added to the health centre includes a doctor's office, a nurse's office and an area for weighing babies. The health centre, which serves more than 4000 residents provides services including: curative, maternal & child health, environmental health, health promotion, mental health, antenatal, postnatal, child health, immunization, disease control and nutrition.

\$30 Million Renovation at Robin's Hall Health Centre

The newly renovated Robin's Hall Health Centre was officially reopened on Wednesday, December 12, 2018, with improved facilities to serve the thousands of people, who reside in the area and surrounding districts in northern Manchester.

The Culture, Health, Arts, Science, and Education (CHASE) Fund provided \$30 million for the rehabilitation of the clinic, which had been closed for some 30 years. Works undertaken included roof and general repairs, painting, among other things.

The health centre offers antenatal and postnatal services, medical care, family planning, child care, mental health and curative services, food handler's clinic, nutrition counselling, pap smears and a Sexually Transmitted Infections (STI) clinic. The facility is open from Monday to Friday and is staffed by a team of doctors, nurses, public health inspectors and community health aides.

New Health Centres Opened in Clarendon

A new type one health centre was opened in Moravia, Clarendon, on August 17, 2018, replacing the clinic that operated from the home of a community member.

The centre was constructed by Food For The Poor with funds donated by Chicago resident, Mrs. Denise Di Biase, and on land donated by the Moravian Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands. Assistance also came from Custos of Clarendon, Hon. William Shagoury. The clinic offers services including child health, family planning, antenatal and curative.

Additionally, thousands now have access to expanded health services at the Rock River Health Centre in Clarendon. The facility, which was officially opened on September 18, 2019 was constructed by Food For the Poor (FFP), with funding provided by American philanthropist, Denise Di Biase.

The health centre provided only antenatal, postnatal and geriatric services but now the community will benefit from a host of other services which includes: child health, family planning, home visits, environmental health and curative.

Medical Laboratory Built for More Than \$20 Million

Funded by United States-based Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and National Alliance of State and Territorial AIDS Directors (NASTAD), a new medical laboratory was built in Christiana, Manchester, valued at more than \$20 million.

The facility's establishment resulted from a collaboration involving the CDC and NASTAD, which have been supporting HIV treatment services administered at the Mandeville Comprehensive Health Centre since 2017.

The lab was formally opened on Friday, September 20, 2019 and will serve to further strengthen the countries' shared partnership and mutual interest in advancing public healthcare delivery.

SRHA Now Has a \$85 Million Histopathology Lab Lab Outfitted With \$44 Million in Equipment

The Southern Regional Health Authority now has a histopathology lab, which was funded by the Lions Club of Mandeville and the CHASE Fund. The building was completed at a cost of \$83 million, with the CHASE Fund donating \$52.6 million of that amount.

The lab which is located on lands adjoining the Mandeville Regional Hospital was officially handed over on Thursday, December 17, 2020. It houses a storage facility, clinical and processing areas as well as a suite of offices and will eliminate the need to send lab work to the Cornwall Regional Hospital to be done.

The histopathology lab will be equipped with state-of-the-art equipment, to the tune of \$43.7 million, capable of providing critical pathology services while also meeting standards of accreditation and fulfilling the mandate of the Ministry of Health and Wellness to reduce cancer incidence. Some of the equipment which have been procured include: digital radiology retrofit systems, a digital medical x-ray system, grossing station and accessories, cassette printers with autoloader and accessories, tissue processors and accessories, tissue embedders with accessories, automated microtome and accessories, microscope, centrifuge and other equipment.

\$38.9 Million Perimeter Fence Project for Lionel Town Hospital

Contracts Signed to Renovate and Expand St. Elizabeth Health Centres

The Malvern and New Market Health Centres in St. Elizabeth will be renovated and expanded at a combined cost of \$37 million. The contracts to begin the works were signed on Thursday, November 3, 2022 with Maxwell Construction Limited for the refurbishing of the New Market facility, at a cost of approximately \$5 million; and Costley's Construction, for the renovation of the Malvern health facility at a cost of \$32 million.

The works to be undertaken at the Malvern Health Centre include: extension to the existing health centre comprising a waiting area, medical records department, two additional offices, entry portico, ramp and steps. There will also be retrofitting and renovation works to the existing building to create a customer service room, weighing room, an additional office and a storage room, in addition to the replacement of heavily termite infested roof with a more sustainable reinforced concrete solution, that offers room for future, upward expansion.

The main objective of the New Market Health Centre is to execute well-needed tiling of the facility's floor to greatly minimize the risk of patients and staff slipping, sliding, falling; thus, mitigating against potential liabilities. The proposed works comprise new flooring to include new porcelain floor tiles.

Chapelton Hospital Reopens After \$309 Million Renovations

Thousands of residents of Chapelton and surrounding areas in Clarendon are benefitting from improved access to health services following the renovation of the Chapelton Community Hospital at a cost of \$309 million.

The project was undertaken through funding by the Culture, Health, Arts, Sports and Education Fund; Jamaican businesswoman/philanthropist, Beverly Nichols through her Push-Start Foundation and the National Health Fund and was officially reopened on December 6, 2022.

It included extensive rehabilitation of the main building with the termite-damaged timber flooring replaced with a sustainable concrete solution, putting in new structural walls and a new roof, construction of an ambulance bay, upgrading of a ramp to allow for stretcher access, restoration of the minor operating theatre, installation of medical gas and a fire detection and alarm system, and electrical works. The facility now boasts a new 20-bed ward (the Beverly Nichols Pavillion), a new pharmacy, laundry department, linen room, and staff lunchroom, expanded food service department, additional parking and driveway, and is equipped with a standby generator system.


Employee Assistance Programme Revamped to Better Serve Workers

The CHAs will also assist with the dissemination of basic information on health and wellbeing, the provision of support for maternal child health and family planning programmes, disease surveillance, communicable diseases, immunization, nutrition, first aid, chronic non-communicable diseases, mental health, home visits, environmental health, health education and promotion and follow up of discharges from hospital.

SRHA Gets 10 Patient Monitors Valued at \$1.8 Million to Help Fight COVID-19

The machines will assist with the continuous monitoring of the vital signs of patients by allowing the health team to acquire critical information without the rigours of manual evaluation.

Clarendon Health Department Executes Successful Quarantine Zones in Two Communities

The Clarendon Health Department executed two successful quarantine zones in the communities of Corn Piece and Sandy Bay in Clarendon. The community of Corn Piece was quarantined for 14 days on March 19, following the first confirmed Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) death- a man who is believed to have travelled to Jamaica from New York on March 12 and was extended for a further two weeks on Friday, April 3. Sandy Bay was quarantined for 14 days, from August 6, 2020 to August 20, 2020.

The quarantine was to facilitate investigations that would lead to early detection of symptoms and prevention of transmission of the deadly COVID-19, further testing of members of the community, close monitoring of members of the community for development of symptoms, early containment of newly detected cases, prevention of new exposures and transmission of disease, and education of members of the communities of infection prevention and control measures.

The Southern Regional Health Authority lauds the efforts of the teams, which went above and beyond to contain the spread of the virus in the communities.

Fifty thousand doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine from India arrived in Jamaica on Monday, March 8, as the government began the process of vaccinating Jamaicans to combat the COVID-19 pandemic.

Vaccination Blitz Exercise Successful in the Southern Region Boosts Vaccine Implementation Programme

The Southern Regional Health Authority's Vaccination Implementation Programme, under the Ministry of Health and Wellness, commenced operation on April 10, 2021 and a Vaccination Operation Centre (VOC) was established to assist and support the execution of the national COVID-19 Vaccination Implementation Programme.

The VOC functioned as a clearing house for information, documentation and other related functions associated with the roll out of the COVID-19 vaccines, while providing much needed assistance in the smooth operations of the weekend vaccination blitz exercises whose responsibilities included, logistics and human resource, among other things.

Up to January 2023, the SRHA administered some 300,000 doses of COVID-19 vaccines, including AstraZeneca, Pfizer, Johnson & Johnson, Sinopharm and Moderna vaccines.

A 40-bed mobile field hospital, donated by the United Sates (US) Government through the US Embassy in Jamaica, valued at \$132 million was officially opened at the May Pen Hospital in Clarendon.

The hospital was opened on Wednesday, September 15, 2021 and forms part of U.S. Southern Command ongoing assistance to nations in the Caribbean, Central America and South America, and is funded by the Command's Humanitarian Assistance Programme. The field hospital which is the second to be set up in Jamaica is also equipped with a generator.

Establishment of COVID-19 Wards in all SRHA Hospitals

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Southern Regional Health Authority (SRHA), through its projects department, converted 125 medical bed spaces to create 90 COVID-19 bed spaces and implemented the following projects:

- Renovation and retrofitting of the Block J medical ward at the Mandeville Regional Hospital in Manchester to create a COVID-19 Regional Isolation Unit. The project included the conversion of a section of the ward to serve as a future High-dependency Unit and was valued at \$21 million.
- The female medical ward at the May Pen Hospital in Clarendon was renovated and retrofitted to create a COVID-19 isolation ward, costing \$43 million.
- An isolation ward for COVID-19 patients was created at the Black River Hospital in St. Elizabeth by renovating the male ward at the hospital. The project was valued at \$17 million.
- The female medical ward at the Percy Junor Hospital in north east Manchester was renovated and retrofitted to create a COVID-19 isolation ward at a cost of \$22 million.
- For the Lionel Town Hospital in Clarendon, the old x-ray and medical lab building was renovated and retrofitted to create a COVID-19 isolation ward valued at \$10 million.
- The Mandeville Regional Hospital is the regional referral centre and was required to make ready accommodations for the treatment and isolation of pregnant women who were COVID-19 patients. Therefore, the obstetrics theatre and recovery room and the neonatal recovery room at the hospital were renovated and retrofitted to treat the women. These works included the restoration and upgrade of the cooling and ventilation systems at the neonatal recovery room and the replacement of the defunct cooling and ventilation systems at the obstetrics theatre and recovery room, valued at \$27 million.
- Additional waiting areas were created in order to facilitate physical distancing requirements as part of the response to the COVID-19 pandemic and to satisfy the protocol whereby patients are screened/ triaged before they enter the health facilities. The covered waiting areas were created at various health centres and one hospital, in addition to partitioned workspaces (fixed cubicles) which were installed at the regional office, valued at \$9 million.

Mandeville Hospital Receives \$7 Million in COVID-19 Support


