# Jamaica's COVID-19 recovery rate up to 68%

COVID-19 recoveries continue to be a ray of hope for Jamaica with the island closing out the week ending Saturday, June 6 with a 68% recovery rate. This followed the release from care of 19 additional persons.

The 19 new releases increased the total number of persons released from care to 404 while the total number of confirmed cases went to 596, with the addition of one new positive.

The new confirmed case was a 41-year-old male of a St. Catherine address, who is a contact of a confirmed case. The case brought to 218 the number of cases classified as contacts of confirmed cases.

#### The 19 new releases increased the total number of persons released from care to 404 while the total number of confirmed cases went to 596, with the addition of one new positive.

In addition, the island had 96 imported cases; 27 local transmission cases not epidemiologically linked; 235 cases linked to a workplace cluster; and 20 that were under investigation.

Some 341 or 57% of the confirmed cases were females and 255 or 43% were males. They range in age from 2 months to 87 years.

Also up to Saturday, Jamaica's testing numbers were at 14,223. In addition to the 596 positives, there were 13,595 negatives and 32 samples pending.

#### Health Workers Recognised for Long Service, Commitment to COVID-19 Response



Some 27 health workers from the Percy Junor Hospital (PJH) in North East Manchester have been recognised and awarded for their longstanding service to healthcare and their outstanding commitment during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The workers were recognised by the Optimist Club of Spalding, Clarendon on Friday, May 29 on the grounds of the hospital. They were awarded for 20 years and more of outstanding service to public healthcare and for their dedicated and exceptional response during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Mr. Michael Bent, Regional Director for the Southern Regional Health Authority (SRHA), which administrates the PJH, lauded the Optimist Club for their kind gesture in recognising the healthcare workers and described it as timely and deserving.

"I want to salute the staff members at the PJH and those who have come in contact with patients with COVID-19. This pandemic has been shocking and frightening; however it has presented a number of opportunities in improving our capacity as a health sector," he said.
